


Avalanche Hazard Forecast - FOR PERIOD 18:00HRS Sat 18/04/2015 TO 18:00HRS Sun 19/04/2015



Hazard Level	Avalanche Probability
Very High	Natural and human triggered avalanches will occur. Numerous very large, often extremely large natural avalanches can be expected.
High	Natural and human triggered avalanches will occur. In some cases, numerous large, often very large sized natural avalanches can be expected.
Considerable	Natural and human triggered avalanches possible, in some cases large, in isolated cases very large sized natural avalanches are possible.
Moderate	Very large sized natural avalanches are unlikely. Human triggering possible in indicated steep places.
Low	Only small and medium sized natural avalanches are possible. Human triggering possible in steep, extreme terrain.

Forecast Weather Influences

Remaining dry and settled with light East-North-Easterly winds, these will strengthen slightly. The freezing level will be well above the summits.

Forecast Snow Stability and Avalanche Hazard

The snowpack will continue to thaw at all levels but will remain generally well bonded on all aspects. Some softening in the surface layers during the day especially on slopes exposed to the sun, but, stability will remain good. Cornices are unstable and prone to collapse. The avalanche hazard will be Low.

Observed Weather Influences

It has remained dry with light winds. The freezing level was above the summits.

Observed Snow Stability and Avalanche Hazard

The snowpack is generally well bonded and stable at all levels, it has slowly softened during the day but stability remains good. The avalanche hazard is Low.

Mountain Conditions

Observed Mountain Travel Conditions

Good visibility. Calm sunny conditions, light East-South-Easterly winds 4 mph. Diminishing snowpack, firm with moist, soft surface layer.

Comments

This is the last report for this season, we leave you with a stable snowpack and dry, sunny, settled conditions. The lowest patch of snow in Glen Coe is at the foot of number six gully on the West face of Aonach Dubh at 447 metres.
