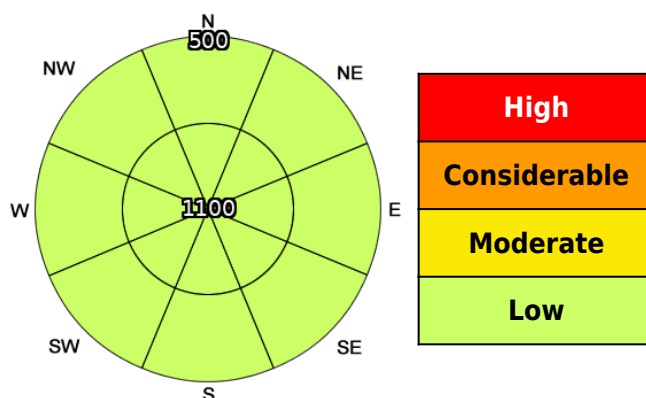
Avalanche Problems



Wind Slab

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

The existing snowpack will remain generally well bonded and stable. Areas of fresh windslab will develop mainly on North-West through North to East aspects above 800 metres. These are expected to be isolated and shallow with steep wind sheltered locations such as gullies, corrie rims and ridge flanks most affected. The avalanche hazard will be Low.



Forecast Weather Influences

Strong South veering South-West winds. After a dry evening precipitation will fall as snow only on the higher summits overnight but then gradually to lower levels during the day. The freezing level will be just above the summits overnight falling to around 700 metres through the day.

Comments

After another windy day on Monday, an area of high pressure gives a more settled day on Tuesday but doesn't stick around and moves into the North Sea on Wednesday.
