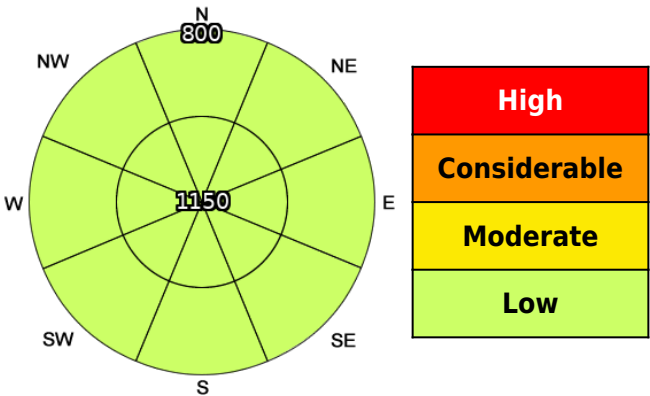
Avalanche Problems



Wet Snow

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

The old snowpack which mainly exists in the higher Northerly and Easterly corries will remain generally stable. Wet snow and sleet overnight may initially form localised surface wet snow instabilities in areas such as gully exits and steep scarp slopes, these areas are not expected to be deep or extensive and with care should be avoidable. Cooler conditions through the day will start to re-freeze the snowpack improving overall stability. The avalanche hazard will be Low.



Forecast Weather Influences

Damp windy conditions with freezing levels around 1300 metres overnight will give some light sleet on the higher tops. By morning the freezing level will lower to 800 metres when it will be mainly dry with fresh Northerly winds.

Comments

Another melt freeze cycle, precipitation amounts overnight are not expected to be significant.
