

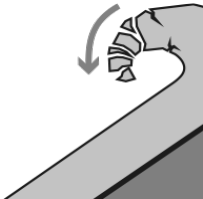

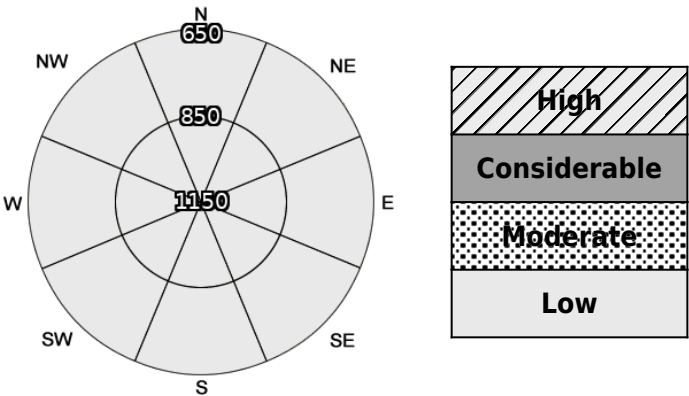
Wind Slab

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

Further poorly bonded windslab will form through Wednesday night mainly on North through East to South-East aspects above 850 metres. These new deposits are not expected to be deep or extensive. Steep wind sheltered locations such as gully tops and coire rims will be most affected. Fragile cornices will start to develop above these locations. Elsewhere the older moist snowpack will refreeze to become firm and icy. The avalanche hazard will be Low.



Forecast Weather Influences

Overnight, the freezing level will fall to around 500 metres with snow showers on strong to gale force Westerly winds. During the day the freezing level will steadily rise to be above the summits by late afternoon. A mostly dry morning then rain falling at most levels around mid afternoon with winds easing becoming West-South-Westerly before strengthening South-Westerly.

Comments

Colder for a spell then getting mild with freezing level above the summits again.
