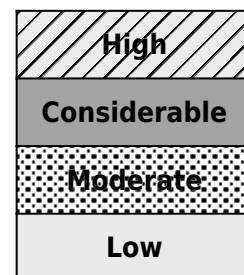
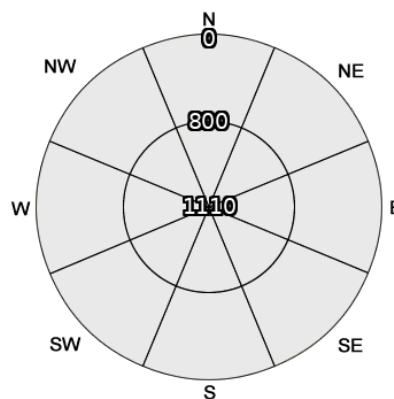


THE AVALANCHE HAZARD WILL BE LOW**Avalanche Hazard Forecast for Monday 25/11/2024****Avalanche Problems****Wind Slab****Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard**

There will be a general consolidation of the depleted snowpack, which will refreeze around the summits during the day. Isolated deposits of fresh windslab will accumulate in steep sheltered East to South-East aspects above 800 metres, but these are not expected to be significant and generally avoidable. The avalanche hazard will be Low.

**Forecast Weather Influences**

Rain at all levels overnight will increasingly turn to sleet and snow mid morning with snow lying above 800 metres as the freezing level lowers to around 850 metres. Storm force Southerly winds at first will veer West-North-West by daybreak, easing to gale force overnight.

Comments

Getting colder over the next couple days with snow expected around the higher summits. Dry mid week onwards. Today will be the last Avalanche Forecast for the current period of snow. Mountain and snowpack information will continue to be available in the blog.
