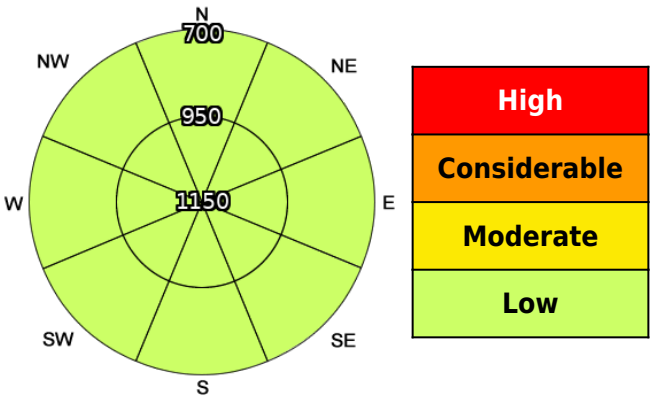

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

The existing snowpack will continue to consolidate and generally stable. Isolated instabilities will develop with unstable windslab forming in wind sheltered locations mainly on North-East to South-East aspects above 950m. Areas most affected will be coire rims and gully tops where existing snow patches remain but amounts are not expected to be deep or extensive. Thaw conditions later in the afternoon with wet snow instabilities developing on similar aspects. The avalanche hazard will be Low.



Forecast Weather Influences

Remaining mainly dry overnight with precipitation initially as snow above 800 metres later in the morning. As the freezing level rises above the summits this will turn to rain at all elevations by late afternoon. The wind will be from Westerly directions, increasing strong to gale force through the day.

Comments

A brief period of new snow followed by thaw conditions at all levels.
