



Wind Slab

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

Many slopes exposed to the recent South-Easterly winds will be stable. Older windslab will exist in localised areas such as sheltered gullies and steep slopes with a mainly Westerly to Northerly aspect above 1000 metres. Wind transport of existing snow later in the day may add fresh windslab to these areas, fresh accumulations are not expected to be deep or extensive. Corrie rims and gully tops will be most affected, cornices will be fragile. The avalanche hazard will be Low.

**Forecast Weather Influences**

Mainly dry conditions with only light snow showers expected later in day. Winds will generally be from the East-South-East, fresh initially becoming strong by evening. The freezing level will be around 1000 metres.

Comments

Only trace of new snow expected, Icy conditions at higher levels.
