





Wind Slab






Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

Moderately to weakly bonded windslab will persist on North-West to North-East aspects above 900 metres. Localised areas of moderately bonded windslab will continue to build on East to South aspects. Gully tops, crag aprons and coire rims will be most affected. Unstable cornices will remain a threat. Below this height, instabilities will be found in steep wind sheltered locations. Wind exposed areas will be stable, firm and icy. The avalanche hazard will be Considerable.



Forecast Weather Influences

Snowfall will continue through the evening, heaviest around midnight, before clearing to leave a dry day. Strong winds from the North-West will increase to gale force for a few hours overnight. These will gradually ease, veering becoming more from the North. The freezing level will fluctuate around 300 metres.
