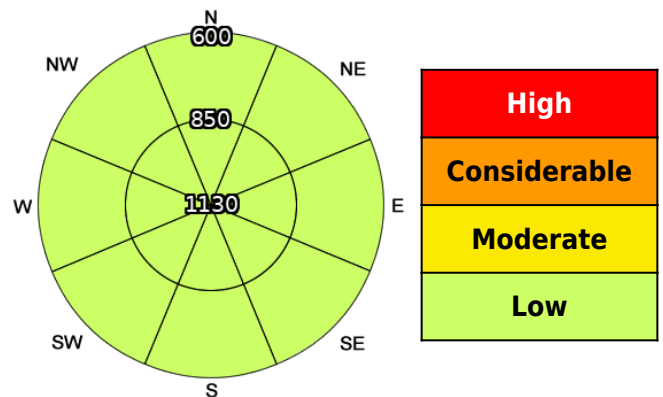
Avalanche Problems



Wind Slab

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

The snowpack will continue to refreeze and stability will be generally good. Isolated areas of moderately bonded windslab will develop on mainly North-West to North-East aspects above 850 metres. These deposits are not expected to be extensive with steep wind sheltered locations such as gully tops being most affected. Elsewhere, the patchy snow cover will have a thin dusting of new snow above around 500 metres. The avalanche hazard will be Low.



Forecast Weather Influences

Fresh Northerly winds will ease overnight then back Southerly and increase through the day to Fresh. Light showers in the evening and afternoon will fall as snow above around 500 metres. Dry overnight and morning. The freezing level will be around 600 metres, briefly lowering overnight.

Comments

Snow becoming firm and icy with unfavourable runouts.
