
Avalanche Hazard Forecast - FOR PERIOD 18:00HRS Sun 07/02/2010 TO 18:00HRS Mon 08/02/2010



Hazard Level	Avalanche Probabilty
Very High	Natural and human triggered avalanches will occur. Numerous very large, often extremely large natural avalanches can be expected.
High	Natural and human triggered avalanches will occur. In some cases, numerous large, often very large sized natural avalanches can be expected.
Considerable	Natural and human triggered avalanches possible, in some cases large, in isolated cases very large sized natural avalanches are possible.
Moderate	Very large sized natural avalanches are unlikely. Human triggering possible in indicated steep places.
Low	Only small and medium sized natural avalanches are possible. Human triggering possible in steep, extreme terrain.

Forecast Weather Influences

It will remain dry with fresh East winds overnight backing North-Easterly by morning. Freezing levels will lower to 450 metres on Monday.

Forecast Snow Stability and Avalanche Hazard

Dry settled and colder conditions will consolidate much of the snowpack. Areas of moderately bonded windslab will remain mainly above 900 metres in the most sheltered of gullies and also on steep West through North to North-Easterly aspects. Steep scarp slopes corniced areas and gully exits will be most affected. The avalanche hazard will be Moderate.

Observed Weather Influences

It has been dry and cool with fresh winds from the East.

Observed Snow Stability and Avalanche Hazard

Areas of moderately bonded soft windslab exist in the most sheltered of gullies and also on West through North to Nort-Easterly aspects mainly above 900 metres. The avalanche hazard is Moderate where deep soft slab exists.

Mountain Conditions

Observed Mountain Travel Conditions	Snow mainly above 700 metres.
Comments	Getting colder with freezing levels expected to be at all but the lowest levels early in the week.
