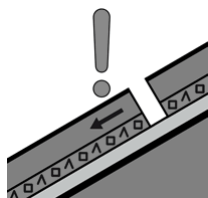
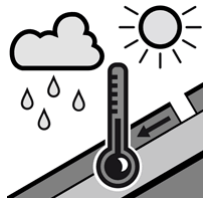
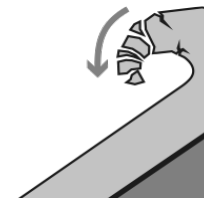
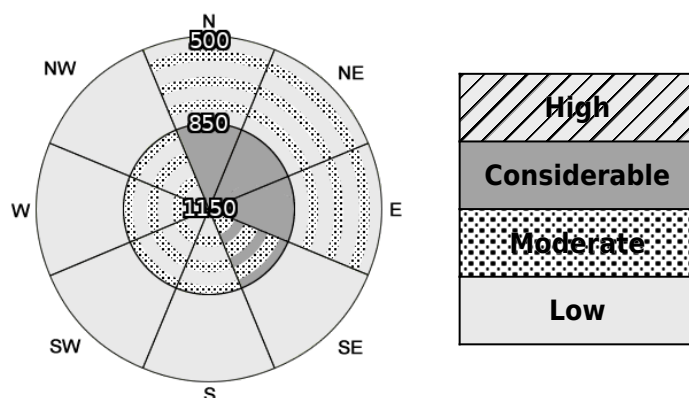


THE AVALANCHE HAZARD WILL BE CONSIDERABLE**Avalanche Hazard Forecast for Saturday 10/01/2015****Avalanche Problems****Wind Slab****Persistent Weak Layers****Wet Snow****Cornices****Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard**

During the night a combination of rising freezing levels and heavy rain will lead to wet snow instabilities particularly where old unstable windslab exists. Avalanches are likely on steep slopes and gullies on North to East aspects above 900m. During the day the snowpack will start to consolidate. New areas of shallow windslab will start to develop on mainly North to Easterly aspects above 850 metres these are not expected to be significant. The avalanche hazard will be Considerable

**Forecast Weather Influences**

Overnight the freezing level will rise to above the summits with rain at all levels. During the early part of the day the freezing level will lower to around 400 metres with light snow showers these will become more frequent in the afternoon. The winds will be Westerly, strong to gale force throughout the period.

Remaining windy and changeable. A period of more prolonged snow moving East on Sunday.
