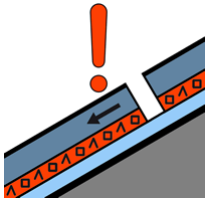

Avalanche Hazard Forecast for Sunday 08/02/2015

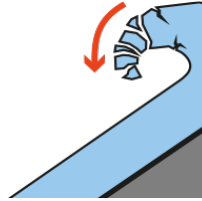

Persistent Weak Layers



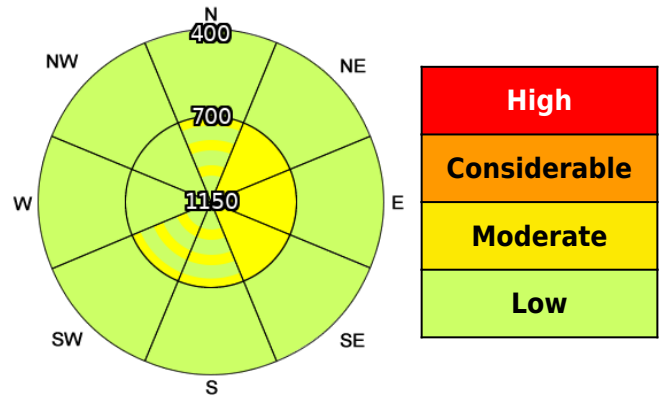

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

The snowpack will continue to consolidate. New snow deposits are not expected to be significant. A few older instabilities will remain on steep slopes, mainly on North-East through East to Southerly aspects above 700 metres. The avalanche hazard will be Moderate.



Forecast Weather Influences

The freezing level will be above the summits for the period. Overnight, the wet bulb freezing level will lower to 400 metres before rising again during the morning. It will remain generally dry until mid afternoon, then some light rain turning to snow over the summits. The winds will be moderate to strong mainly from the West.

Comments

The forecast for next 48 hours is to remain mainly dry with some cloud in the North and West, light snow at times. The winds will be strong Westerlies and the freezing levels remaining around summit level.
