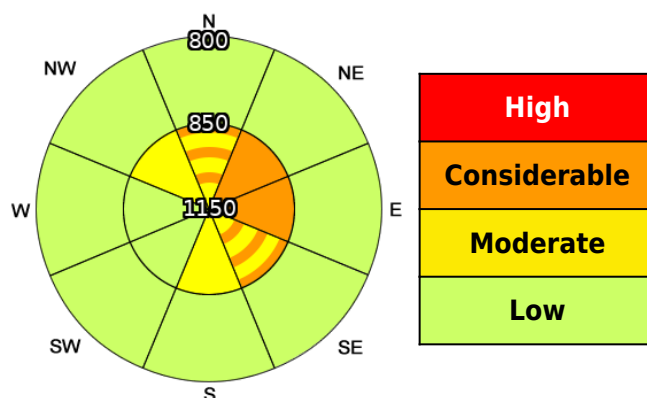

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

Snowfall with subsequent drifting and redistribution of deposits will lead to weakly bonded windslab forming in sheltered locations mainly on North through East to South-East aspects above around 850 metres where avalanches are likely. North-West and South aspects will also be affected by cross-loading. Unstable cornices will continue to develop. Exposed terrain will be scoured and stable. The avalanche hazard will be Considerable.



Forecast Weather Influences

New snowfall, heaviest overnight to around 800 metres then lighter showers to valley level. Winds will be changeable, Southerly early evening but by day mostly Westerly and gusting storm force.

Comments

Forecast to be a very windy and cold day on the hills.
