

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

Although little snowfall is expected, there will be significant snow redistribution. Localised unstable windslab will continue to develop on steep sheltered locations, mainly on South-West to North-West aspects above 700 metres. Areas most affected will be coire headwalls and gully exits. Additionally, moderately well bonded windslab will persist on localised steep slopes mainly on North-East to South-East aspects above 650 metres. The avalanche hazard will be Considerable.



Forecast Weather Influences

A mainly dry day is expected with an occasional snow shower, mainly on the inland hills. A strong to gale force Easterly wind overnight will gradually ease slightly through the day. It will feel very cold with the freezing level peaking at 400 metres, and -6C expected at summit level.

Comments

Settled weather expected over the next few days but snow redistribution will occur with a strong Easterly wind. Remaining cold and high windchill.
