#### Avalanche Hazard Forecast for Thursday 24/03/2016


##### Avalanche Problems

##### Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

The limited cover of old snow will remain well bonded, stable and firm underfoot. Small pockets of windslab will develop in sheltered locations mostly overlying old snow with predominantly the tops of gullies and corrie rims on North to East aspects above 800 metres most affected. Amounts are likely to be small in extent and generally avoidable. The avalanche hazard will be Moderate.



##### Forecast Weather Influences

Precipitation, falling as snow above 800 metres overnight will become less intense during the day. Winds predominantly South-Westerly with gusts to 50 mph overnight will increase in strength around dawn before veering Westerly and reducing in ferocity later in the afternoon. Freezing level overnight around 700 metres, rising briefly above the summits during the morning before falling back to 700 metres by the end of the forecast period.

##### Comments

Impression from the roadside is that there is no snow. However snow does remain in the tops of gullies, previously sheltered locations, around corrie rims and on high Easterly aspects. This snow is hard.
