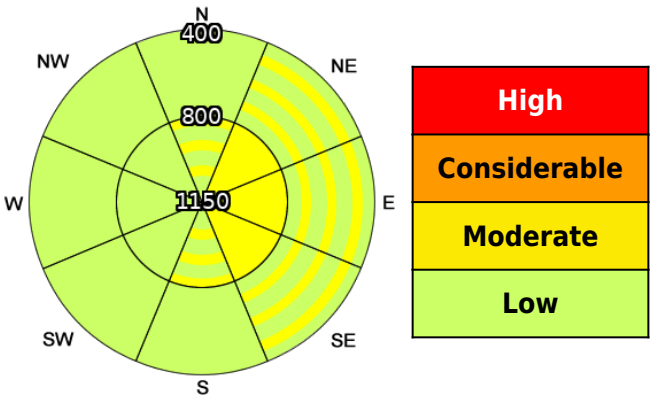
Avalanche Problems



Wind Slab

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

The existing snowpack will re-freeze and consolidate in the colder conditions. Fresh areas of windslab will be deposited on mainly North-East to South-East aspects above 800 metres. Some instabilities will exist where the fresh windslab forms in sufficient depth and overlies the older snowpack. The avalanche hazard will be Moderate



Forecast Weather Influences

Overnight the freezing level will drop to around 400 metres before rising again through the day to around 800 metres. Showers will fall as snow above 300 meters during the morning rising to 700 meters by evening. Strong winds will be from the West.

Comments

Even by Glen Coe standards today was a very wet day. Colder on Monday, but remaining snowpack not very extensive.
