



Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

Unstable windslab will continue to build on mainly North-East to South-Easterly aspects above 900 metres. Additionally, instabilities will persist on North-West to North aspects. Gully exits, coire headwalls, coire rims, steep and convex terrain will be most affected. Other aspects and gully flanks will also have unstable deposits due to cross loading. Cornices overhanging all Northerly aspects will be liable to collapse. Generally good below 900 metres. The avalanche hazard will be Considerable



Forecast Weather Influences

Winds will remain strong West-South-Westerly overnight veering West-North-Westerly during the day decreasing in strength to around 30 mph on the tops, gusting stronger. Precipitation will fall as snow-showers overnight, generally dry in the day but with drifting snow continuing. Freezing levels will be around 800 metres throughout the forecast period.
