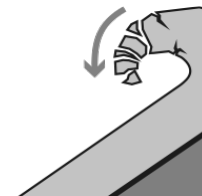
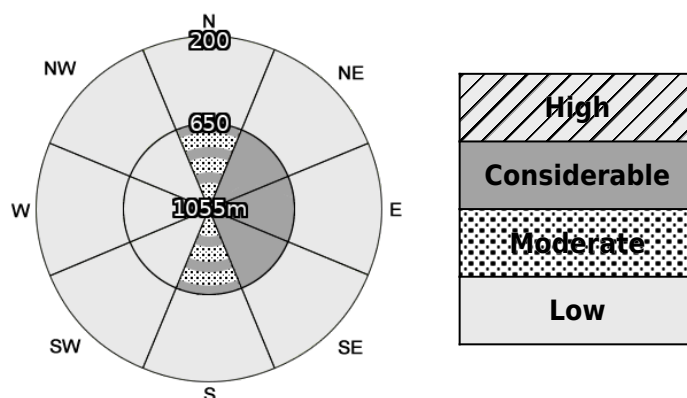

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

Fresh unstable windslab will continue to build on mainly North-East to South-East facing aspects, above 650 metres, adding to the existing weakly bonded snowpack. Greatest accumulations will be in sheltered gullies, corrie rims and crag aprons. Cornices will continue to build above these aspects and be fragile and prone to collapse. Other aspects will be affected by cross loading. Exposed windward slopes and summits are firm and icy. The avalanche hazard will be Considerable


Forecast Weather Influences

Winds becoming Southerly and strengthening to storm force during the night then veering Westerly to become Moderate by early morning. Increasing slightly during the day and becoming South-Westerly. An intense period of snow showers developing during the night and early morning and dying out during the day. Freezing level rising slightly during the night but dropping again to around 200 metres during the day.

Comments

Avalanche activity noted on Easterly aspects of Beinn Liath Mhor, Sgurr Ruadh and Fuar Toll in the Achnashellach hills by rescue teams operating in that area.
