



Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

Unstable and widespread windslab will continue to develop on South-West through West to Northerly aspects above 800m, with wind sheltered slopes, crag aprons, gullies and convex shaped terrain especially affected, here avalanches likely. Prone to collapse cornices will also build. Below this level and above 550 metres moderately bonded dense windslab will be present on mainly steep banks and confines. Elsewhere the snowpack will be firm and stable. The avalanche hazard will be Considerable



Forecast Weather Influences

Strong Easterly winds will become light during the night before veering Southerly then becoming strong South-South-Easterly. Snowfall will continue into the evening and die out, then mostly dry until near the end of the forecast period. Freezing levels will be 700 to 800 metres through the day.
