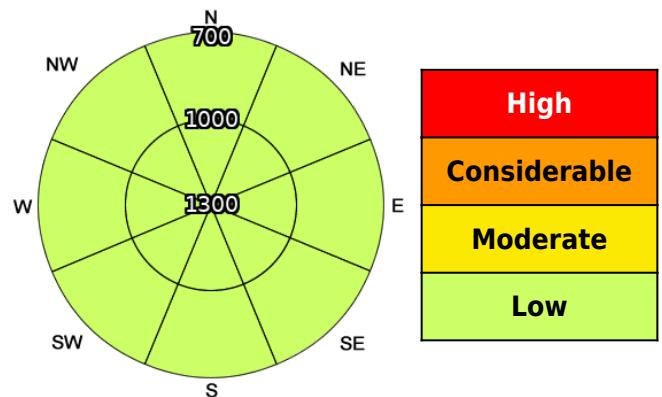
Avalanche Problems



Wind Slab

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

The snowpack will stabilise further above 900 metres due to a refreeze as the freezing level falls below the summits. Isolated accumulations of windslab will be deposited on North to East aspects above 900 metres as the day progresses. These will be shallow, avoidable and limited in extent. At lower elevations little change is anticipated as the snowpack continues to thaw, remaining well bonded and stable in most locations. The avalanche hazard will be Low.



Forecast Weather Influences

Winds will be moderate to strong, initially from the South-West veering to the West later. After a dry night precipitation is expected from the early hours of the morning. This will fall as snow above 800 metres although amounts are anticipated to be small. The freezing level will fall to around 900 metres overnight and remain at this altitude for the duration of the day.

Comments

The snow surface will be icy and firm above 900 metres tomorrow due to a refreeze. Unarrested slips or falls are likely to be of significant consequence.
