

Avalanche Problems



Wind Slab

Forecast Snow Stability & Avalanche Hazard

Isolated deposits of moderately bonded windslab will form in wind sheltered areas such as gullies, core rims and crag aprons. Areas most affected will be North through East to South aspects above 900 metres. These deposits are not expected to gain significant depth and in many places will overlie bare ground. Elsewhere remaining old snow patches will be firm, well bonded and stable. The avalanche hazard will be Low.



Forecast Weather Influences

The freezing level will be around 1200 metres at the start of the night, lowering from early morning to be around 600 metres by dawn and around 100 metres by the end of the afternoon. Showers will initially be rain at all levels turning to snow as the freezing level lowers, with snow above 600 metres by dawn, a mainly dry day will follow. Winds will be very strong West-South-West over night becoming moderate North-West during the day.
